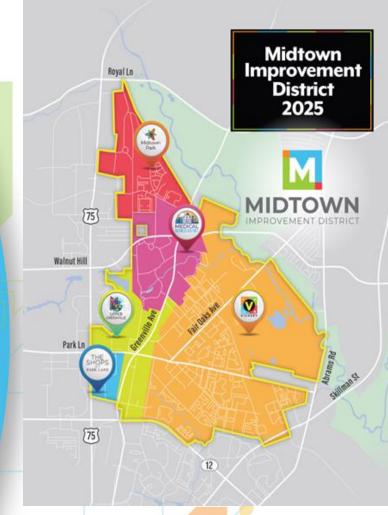

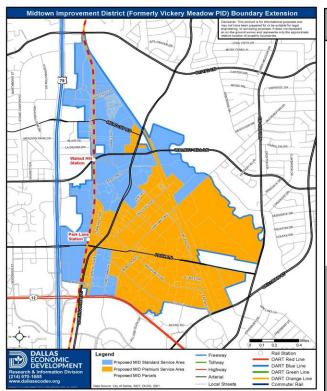

## **Property Standards**



- Utilized \$240.4K in 2024 on Property Standards
- PID has been able to assist and direct City of Dallas areas of extreme distress, resulting in numerous mass encampment cleanups
- Improved areas include but not limited to: Fair Oaks, Parklane, Hemlock, Shady Brooks, Twin Hills, and Skillman.
- MID has significantly expanded its maintenance contract perimeters in the district totaling at 104.7K
- MID has replaced 172 streetlights throughout the MID and maintain monthly usage
- Total annual contribution of \$17k for lighting

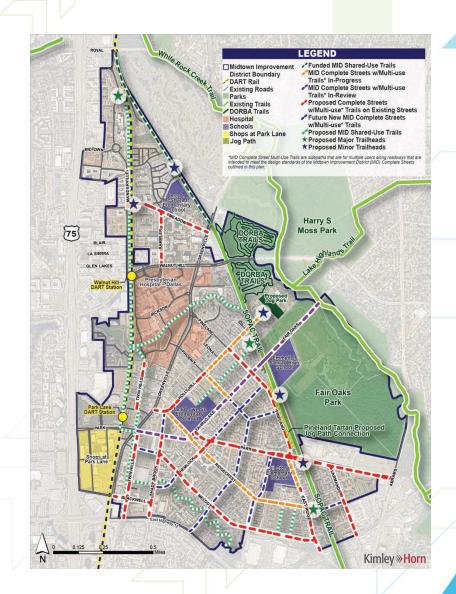

- Finalizing new management agreement with City







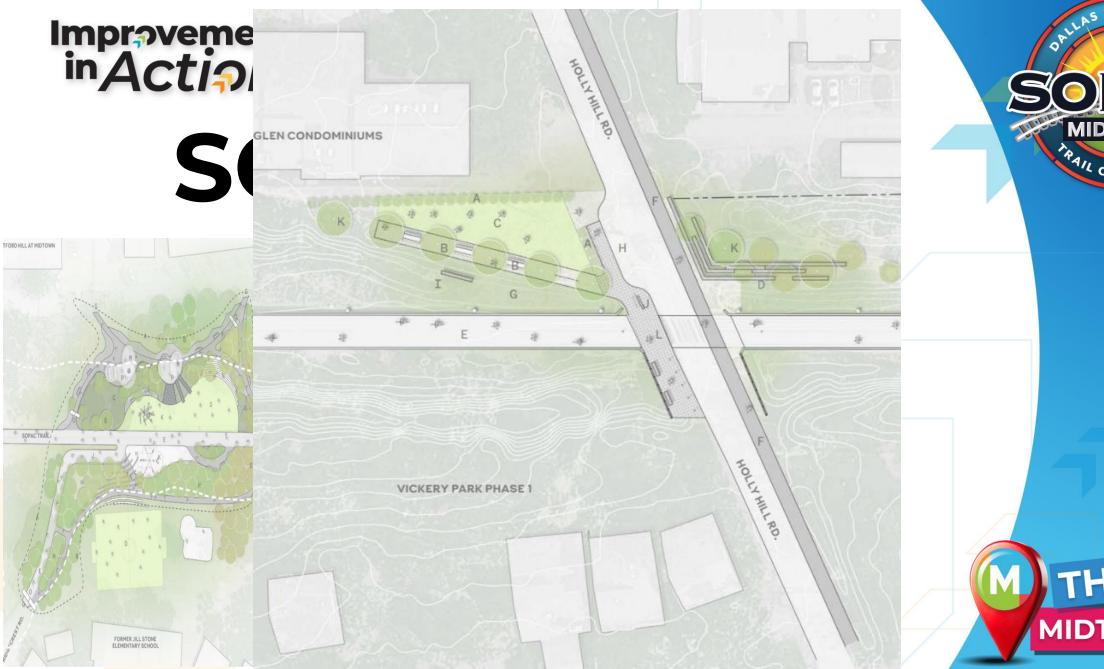

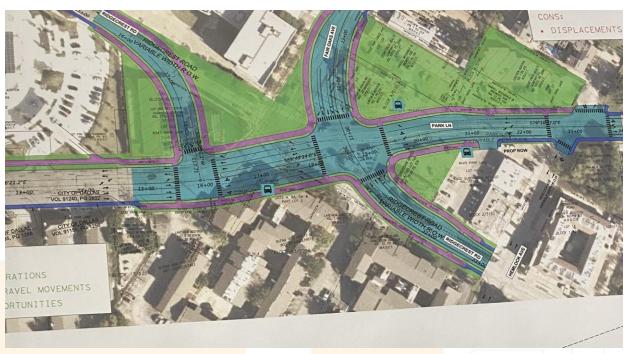

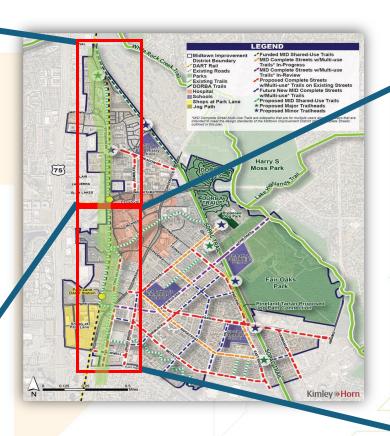

## 2025 Strategic Goals

- Implement installations of 2 of the 4 approved and budgeted Trail Heads(Designs for 1st Trail head have been completed and submitted, MID Under contractual negotiations for SQPAC Trail Management Contract; Completion Of Contract is the expected start date of Construction)
- Develop Economic Development strategy to release new programs structured for business memberships (programs to include additional security measures, reports, etc.)
- Initiate the design process for the new bike trail on Oncor's transmission line property
- Further develop safety alliances/nets in the District for preventative safety measures (Include DD, Texas Health, DIS, and Heartland Patrol and Security)
- Create a funnel of resources to decrease homelessness encampments within the district (Including inspections of the district with Council, City Officials, and DPD)
- Further develop functioning Internship Program that trains collegiate students the structure of Nonprofit, City Leadership, and more
